**Subject:** Complete Roof Tear Offs For Steep-Slope Roofs

**What Is A Roof Tear Off?** **ASTM D1079** defines a “tear off” as... the removal of all layers of existing roofing system(s) down to the structural deck.

**When Is A Complete Tear Off Required?** **The International Building Code, 2015 Edition (IBC 2015)**... requires removal (tear off) of an existing roof system when:

1. The existing roof is over a wood shake, slate, clay, cement or asbestos-cement tile roof system.
2. There are two or more layers of any existing roofing systems present.
3. The existing roof system is wet or deteriorated to the point that it will not be a suitable substrate.

**IMPORTANT:** When roof system removal is required, the code **requires all layers** of the existing roof system, including underlayment, to be removed down to the deck.

**What Are The Benefits Of A Tear Off?** **A complete tear off...** of an existing steep-slope roof:

- Is required for certain types of enhanced warranty coverage.
- Allows for the inspection of the structural roof deck.
- Allows moisture-related issues including mold and rot to be easily detected.
- Allows for replacement of decking or structural elements that are found to be deficient.
- Provides a smooth substrate for the installation of the new roof.
- Helps ensure that the deck will provide adequate roofing nail holding strength.
- Allows the installation of a leak barrier such as GAF StormGuard® Film-Surfaced Leak Barrier or WeatherWatch® Mineral-Surfaced Leak Barrier at all critical areas (eaves, rakes, valleys, pipes, hips etc.).
- Avoids potential issues of incompatibility among leak barriers. Refer to Technical Advisory Bulletin “**Re-Roofing and Self-Adhered Leak Barriers**” (TAB-R-2011-147) for more information regarding leaving existing self-adhered leak barriers in place during re-roofing.
